



Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provide health and long-term care coverage to more than 1.6 million low-income children, pregnant women, adults, seniors, and people with disabilities in Tennessee. Medicaid is a major source of funding for safety-net hospitals and nursing homes. Federal policy proposals could fundamentally change the scope and financing of the program.

Snapshot of Tennessee's population









Per 100,000 population in 2014

In 2015, 19% of people in TN were covered by Medicaid/CHIP.




Since implementation of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), Medicaid/CHIP enrollment has increased in TN.




Did TN expand Medicaid through the ACA?



The uninsured rate in TN has decreased.




In TN, Medicaid/CHIP covers:





Nationally, Medicaid is comparable to private insurance for access and satisfaction – the uninsured fare far less well.



Medicaid coverage contributes to positive outcomes:

- Long-term health and educational gains for children
- Improvements in health and financial security






How does Medicaid work and who is eligible?

Each Medicaid program is unique:



Medicaid/CHIP eligibility levels are highest for children and pregnant women.





How are Medicaid funds spent and how is the program financed?

Medicaid plays a key role in the U.S. health care system, accounting for:





On a per enrollee basis, Medicaid spending growth is slower than private health care spending, in part due to lower provider payments.



In FY 2015, Medicaid spending in TN was \$9.1 billion.




53.2%

of long-term care spending in TN is for home and community-based care.

of beneficiaries in TN are in managed care plans.

In 2011, most Medicaid beneficiaries in TN were children and adults, but most spending was for the elderly and people with disabilities.



279,100

Medicare beneficiaries (26%) in TN rely on Medicaid for assistance with Medicare premiums and cost-sharing and services not covered by Medicare, particularly longterm care.

31%

of Medicaid spending in TN is for Medicare beneficiaries.

Federal funding to states is guaranteed with no cap and fluctuates depending on program needs.

In TN the federal share (FMAP) is 65.0%. For every \$1 spent by the state, the Federal government matches \$1.85.

Expansion states receive an increased FMAP for the expansion population. TN did not expand Medicaid and did not receive additional federal funds.

What are the implications of reduced federal financing in a Medicaid block grant or a per capita cap?

Congress may soon debate proposals to reduce federal Medicaid funding through ACA repeal and federal caps.

The March 2016 Budget Resolution would reduce federal Medicaid spending by 41% nationally over the 2017-2026 period.

The impact of a block grant or per capita cap will depend on funding levels, but could include:



Increases in the number of uninsured



Reduced access and service utilization, decreased provider revenues (to hospitals, nursing homes, etc.), and increased uncompensated care costs




Increased pressure on state budgets



Decreased economic activity

A per capita cap could lock in historical state differences or redistribute federal funds across states.
