
UNINSURED ADULTS IN ALABAMA WHO WOULD BECOME ELIGIBLE FOR MEDICAID UNDER EXPANSION


The ACA expanded Medicaid coverage to nearly all adults with incomes up to 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (\$17,236 for an individual in 2019). If Alabama were to expand its Medicaid program, 223,000 uninsured nonelderly adults would become eligible for coverage, 54% of the state's uninsured nonelderly adult population.





77% of those who would become eligible under Medicaid expansion are childless adults, a group historically excluded from Medicaid eligibility.


Who Are Uninsured Adults Who Would Become Eligible for Medicaid if Alabama Expanded?




Over 6 in 10 are adults living below poverty.



More than **half** are White, non-Hispanic.



Almost **4 in 10** are middleaged and 14% are nearelderly, who are more likely to have substantial health needs.





Over **half** are women even though many women qualify for Medicaid as caregiver parents.
